Cerza and his fellow teammates came close to winning the championship, losing in their semifinal round, finishing in a tie with another team for third place.

"Everyone is so well prepared at the national championship," said Cerza. "I think when you get that far into the competition, it's almost about luck of the draw. No matter how much you study, some topic could always pop up that you just aren't ready for."
