

OTC Medicine Safety Vocabulary

- Active Ingredient(s) (section of the Drug Facts label) The ingredients in the medicine that make it work
- brand name drug A drug sold with a commercial name, not generic
- Directions (section of the Drug Facts label) Indicates the amount or dose of medicine, how often to take it, and how much you can take in one day
- 4. dose The amount of medicine to take
- 5. dosing device/measuring tool The syringe, cup, or other receptacle that is packaged with your over-thecounter (OTC) medicine, meant specifically to measure doses of that medicine
- drug A substance for treatment, or prevention, of disease; intended to affect the structure or a function of the body
- 7. Drug Facts label Every OTC medicine has a Drug Facts label printed on the package. This label gives you important information about what the medicine does, how to take it safely, and who should not take it
- **8. generic drug** A drug that is the same as a brand name drug in dosage,

- safety, strength, how it is taken, quality, performance, and intended use
- Inactive Ingredient(s) (section of the Drug Facts label) Ingredients not intended to treat symptoms, such as color or flavorings
- **10. medicine** A substance for treatment, or prevention, of disease; same as drug
- 11. medicine misuse Taking a drug for a purpose or in a way that is not intended
- 12.OTC Over-the-Counter medicine that is bought in a pharmacy, drugstore, or supermarket and obtained without the need for a health professional's prescription
- **13.Other Information (section of the Drug Facts label)** Additional information on the Drug Facts label including how to store the medicine
- **14. overdose** Using more medicine than recommended on the label or prescribed
- **15. pharmacist** A professional whose job it is to prepare and dispense medicine
- **16. pharmacy** A place where prescription and OTC drugs can be purchased

- **17. physician** A doctor, a professional who practices medicine
- 18. Poison Control Centers Offer free, confidential, expert medical advice 24 hours a day, seven days a week through the Poison Help line at 1-800-222-1222 and online at www.PoisonHelp.org
- 19. prescription Medicine that is specially ordered for you by a doctor or other qualified healthcare practitioner, available only from a pharmacist
- 20. Questions (section of the Drug Facts label) Company phone number to call
- 21.Rx Prescription medicine
- **22. self-medicate** Choosing to take medicine by yourself

- **23. side effects** Unwanted and/or unexpected effects from a medicine
- **24. strength** How much of the active ingredient is present in each unit (for example, each pill)
- **25. symptoms** Physical or mental conditions that may indicate illness and can be described by the person feeling them
- 26. Uses (section of the Drug Facts label) The symptoms the medicine treats
- **27. Warnings (section of the Drug Facts label)** Safety information including side effects, the questions you should ask a doctor before taking the medicine, and which medicines to avoid using at the same time
