YOUR VOTE = YOUR POWER

Voting lets you shape laws, policies, and the leaders who represent you.

NOT JUST PRESIDENTIAL

Local elections impact schools, roads, and community issues—even more directly than national races.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT STARTS NOW

Teens can pre-register in some states and get involved through advocacy, volunteering, or staying informed.

TRUSTED SOURCES MATTER

Misinformation spreads easily; always double-check election facts through official channels.

CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY

Voting is a right and a responsibility. It ensures your voice is heard in decisions that affect your life.

ELECTION CYCLES

Not all elections happen every four years. Understanding the election calendar helps you plan ahead.

BALLOT BASICS

A ballot lists the races and issues you're voting on. Ballots may include local measures or constitutional amendments.

INFORMED CHOICES

Researching candidates and propositions helps you vote based on facts, not slogans or ads.

YOUTH IMPACT

Even before you're eligible to vote, you can influence your peers, raise awareness, and help others register.

VOTING RIGHTS EVOLVE

Laws around voting, like ID requirements or access to early voting can change, so it's important to stay updated.

ADVOCACY IN ACTION

Beyond voting, writing letters, signing petitions, or joining community groups are powerful ways to make change.

Voting and Civics



Vocabulary

ABSENTEE BALLOT

A ballot filled out at home and returned by mail or drop box before Election Day, used when not voting in person

BALLOT MEASURE

A question or proposal on the ballot that voters approve or reject

BIPARTISAN

Supported by members of both major political parties

CONSTITUENT

A person who lives in a district and is represented by an elected official

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

The part of government that enforces laws (includes the President, governors, etc.)

JUDICIAL BRANCH

The branch that interprets laws and ensures they are fairly applied (includes courts and judges)

LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

The part of government that makes laws (includes Congress or state legislatures)

MIDTERM ELECTION

Elections held halfway through a president's term, often for Congress or local offices

PROPOSITION

A proposed law change that voters can approve or reject on the ballot

TERM LIMIT

A rule that caps how many times someone can be elected to the same office

VOTER REGISTRATION

The process of signing up to be eligible to vote
